Researching Graduate Programs



Researching graduate programs and schools can seem daunting, but the following steps might be of some help.

- 1. Decide on the type of graduate program that interests you. Some factors to consider include:
 - Size
 - Faculty
 - Location
 - Facilities
 - Reputation
 - Financial Aid
 - Tuition
 - Student Organizations
 - Campus Environment
 - Placement Rates

Peterson's Guides--various guides that outline what degrees are offered by what colleges and universities--are an excellent resource and can be found online or in most university career centers.

- Research specific programs and develop and rank a criteria sheet to compare different schools and programs.
 - Research program department catalogs as opposed to general catalogs to get more specific information about program faculty, coursework, etc.
 - Review specific Peterson's Guides to compare programs
 - Review educational rankings to find out program/school rankings
 - Talk to faculty members to learn about the schools they attended
 - Identify professional associations in your career field. These groups often publish guides to graduate education targeted specifically to one profession or career.
- 3. Begin narrowing your options.
 - Visit the campuses you are considering.
 - Talk to people you know who attended the school you are considering to get more insight into their programs.
 - Ask the department for the names of current graduate students who might be willing to talk to you about their experience with the program.
