The Annette Strauss Institute envisions a democracy where all citizens are informed, vote, and are actively involved in improving their communities. Through nonpartisan research, education, and outreach, the Institute seeks to understand and overcome the obstacles to civic engagement.

Our History

Founded in 2000 to respond to growing political cynicism and disaffection in the United States, the Institute is named after Annette Strauss, an extraordinary woman whose accomplishments and commitments were legion. Mrs. Strauss served on the Dallas City Council from 1983 through 1987 and then as mayor from 1987 to 1991. By the time she became mayor, Mrs. Strauss had spent some forty years as a city volunteer and community activist. As mayor of Dallas, Mrs. Strauss was said to be one of the few persons who had equal access to the City's diverse communities. When she died in December of 1998, an entire city mourned her passing.

Dr. Regina Lawrence is Director of the Annette Strauss Institute at the University of Texas at Austin, where she holds the Jesse H. Jones Centennial Chair in the School of Journalism . She earned a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Washington in 1997. Dr. Lawrence's books include *The Politics of Force: Media and the Construction of Police Brutality* (University of California Press, 2000); *When the Press Fails: Political*

Power and the News Media from Iraq to Katrina (University of Chicago Press, 2007, co-authored with W. Lance Bennett and Steven Livingston); and *Hillary Clinton's Race for the White House: Gender Politics and the Media on the Campaign Trail* (Lynne Rienner Publishers, 2009, co-authored with Melody Rose).

Lawrence has written numerous articles analyzing media coverage of high profile news events and policy issues, including the Abu Ghraib prison scandal, shootings in public schools, the obesity epidemic, welfare reform, and the "death panels" controversy. Her current research includes journalists' use of social media to cover politics; media coverage of female political candidates; and film and politics. Articles she has authored and co-authored have appeared in *Journal of Communication*, *Political Communication*, *Political Research Quarterly*, *Journalism*, and the *International Journal of Press/Politics*. Lawrence was a research fellow at the Joan Shorenstein Center on the Press, Politics, and Public Policy at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University (2003), and has served as chair of the Political Communication.

Dr. Lance Bennett



Dr. Lance Bennett received his Ph.D. in political science from Yale University in 1974, and has taught since then at the University of Washington, where he is Ruddick C. Lawrence Professor of Communication and Professor of Political Science. He is the founder and director of the Center for Communication and Civic Engagement, which is dedicated to understanding how communication processes and technologies can enhance citizen engagement with

social life, politics, and global affairs.

Bennett has lectured internationally on the importance of media and information systems in civic life and is the author or editor of ten books, including *When the Press Fails: Political Power and the News Media from Iraq to Katrina* (University of Chicago Press, 2007, co-authored with Regina Lawrence and Steven Livingston). His current research interests include: press-government relations and the quality of public information, strategic communication campaigns, communication and the organization of social movements, transnational activism, and digital media and youth civic engagement. An ongoing area of research and public scholarship is Civic Learning Online, a project that can be viewed at engagedyouth.org.

Dr. Peter Levine @CivicYouth @PeterLevine



Dr. Peter Levine is Director of the Center for Information and Research on Civic Learning (CIRCLE) and the Lincoln Filene Professor of Citizenship & Public Affairs in Tufts University's Jonathan Tisch College of Citizenship and Public Service. Levine graduated from Yale in 1989 with a degree in philosophy. Levine studied philosophy at Oxford on a Rhodes Scholarship, receiving his doctorate in 1992. From 1991 until 1993, he was a research associate at Common Cause, a nonpartisan,

nonprofit advocacy organization. In the late 1990s, he served as Deputy Director of the National Commission on Civic Renewal.

Levine is the author of *We Are the Ones We Have Been Waiting For: the Promise of Civic Renewal in America* (Oxford University Press, 2013), as well as five other scholarly books on philosophy and politics, and a novel. He has served on the boards or steering committees of AmericaSpeaks, Street Law Inc., the Newspaper Association of America Foundation, the Campaign for the Civic Mission of Schools, the Kettering foundation, the American Bar Association Committee's for Public Education, the Paul J. Aicher Foundation, and the Deliberative Democracy Consortium.





Ilir Zherka @NCoC



Ilir Zherka is a life-long advocate of human rights and civic engagement. Ilir joined the National Conference on Citizenship (NCoC) as executive director in 2012. He leads the development and execution of NCoC programs, operations, and serves as principal spokesperson. Previously, he was the Executive Director of DC Vote. At DC Vote, Zherka organized a coalition of 100 nonprofit advocacy organizations to promote civic participation and democracy in the nation's capital.

In addition to serving as an advisor to the last four Democratic presidential campaigns, he has gained political experience working in the Clinton administration and on Capitol Hill.

Zherka is a recognized community leader. In 2012, the District of Columbia Mayor Vincent C. Gray declared October 26th to be Ilir Zherka Day for his service to Washington, D.C. as Executive Director of DC Vote. He was selected to join Leadership Greater Washington and has received numerous awards, including the Meyer Foundation Exponent Award, the National Urban League's Whitney M. Young Jr. Leadership Award, and the United Nations Association Human Rights Community Award. He has taught emerging leaders at Georgetown University and as an associate with the Human Systems Dynamics Institute. He is also the author of *Winning Inside the Game: the Handbook of Advocacy Strategies*.

Larry Schooler oversees civic engagement and dispute resolution for the City of Austin, and he assists other communities, agencies, and organizations as a public engagement consultant, mediator, and facilitator. He teaches at Southern Methodist University and has delivered facilitation and public engagement training courses and speeches across the country and in

Europe. He is also the U.S. president of the International Association for Public Participation. Larry spearheaded development of the community engagement website SpeakUpAustin.org, which has won numerous national awards. His work has also been cited by, among others, Governing Magazine; the Alliance for Innovation; and the book Slow Democracy.

Prior to this work, Larry reported stories locally, nationally, and internationally for National Public Radio and Voice of America. Larry has a bachelor's degree in history from Yale University and a master's degree in conflict analysis and resolution from Nova Southeastern University, where he is completing a doctorate. He is married to award-winning commercial real estate broker Jolie Schooler, and the father to two-year-old Sammy Schooler and a second boy expected in May, 2014.

texastribune.org; in the pages of the New York Times; and in newspapers and on TV and radio stations across the state. In not quite four years in operation, the Tribune has won four Edward R. Murrow Awards from the Radio Television Digital News

Association, a Sigma Delta Chi award for excellence in journalism from the Society of Professional Journalists, a general excellence award from the Online News Association and a Knight-Batten award for innovations in journalism.

Before co-founding the Tribune, Evan spent nearly 18 years at *Texas Monthly* magazine, including eight years as Editor and a year as President and Editor-in-Chief. On his watch, *Texas Monthly* twice won the National Magazine Award for General Excellence. For eight years, Evan hosted the Lone Star Emmy Award-winning weekly interview program Texas Monthly Talks, which aired on PBS stations statewide. He currently hosts "Overheard with Evan Smith," airing on PBS stations nationally.

A New York native, he has a bachelor's degree in public policy from Hamilton College and a master's degree in journalism from Northwestern University.

Dr. Sylvia Manzano is a Senior Analyst with Latino Decisions. She holds a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Arizona. Manzano works with clients on strategic planning, survey design, data analysis, demographic research and focus group facilitation. Her most recent work includes design and analysis of the Latino National Election Eve Poll; national studies on Latino stereotypes and ethnic attitude;, and a series of projects that develop

strategies to engage Latino voters and promote engagement.

Manzano's academic research on Latino politics and policy issues has appeared in many academic outlets including *Political Research Quarterly, State Politics and Policy Quarterly, Politics and Gender,* and *Urban Affairs Review.* She has been interviewed by numerous media outlets including NBC Latino, The New York Times, La Opinion, Fox News Latino, The Los Angeles Times and National Public Radio. Prior to joining Latino Decisions, Manzano taught at Texas A&M University.

Chuck DeVore is Vice President of Policy at the Texas Public Policy Foundation, one of America's premier conservative state-level public policy think tanks.

From 2004 to 2010, DeVore served as a Republican member of the California State Assembly and represented the 70th District which includes the cities of Irvine, Newport Beach, Laguna Beach, and portions of Orange County. He was the Vice

Chairman of the Assembly Committee on Revenue and Taxation and served on the Joint Legislative Audit and Veterans Affairs Committee. DeVore has been honored as Legislator of the Year by seven groups, and the Americanism Educational League awarded him their American Spirit Award in 2010, a recognition once given to Ronald Reagan.

In 2010, DeVore competed for the Republican nomination for U.S. Senate in California, earning more than 450,000 votes and raising more than \$2.6 million. Before joining the Assembly, DeVore worked in the aerospace industry, where he served as an executive and corporate vice president. DeVore served as a Reagan White House appointee in the Pentagon from 1986 to 1988. As Special Assistant for Foreign Affairs his duties included working with Congress to advance the President's foreign and military policy. He later served on staff for a U.S. Congressman.In 1983. DeVore enlisted in the United States Army Reserve. He earned an ROTC scholarship that allowed him to attend Claremont McKenna College where he graduated with honors with a degree in Strategic Studies in 1985 and was commissioned as an officer. After more than 24 years of active reserve service, DeVore retired from the Army National Guard. He is now a Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army (retired) Reserve. He and his wife Diane have two daughters and reside in Dripping Springs.



Ann Beeson @CPPP TX



A renowned social justice lawyer, former philanthropy executive, and frequent public speaker and writer, Ann Beeson joined the Center for Public Policy Priorities in 2013. She was previously the Executive Director of U.S. Programs at the Open Society Foundations, where she promoted human rights, justice, and accountability nationwide.

Beeson was the national Associate Legal Director of the American Civil Liberties Union, where she worked from 1995-2007. She argued twice

before the U.S. Supreme Court, litigated numerous cases around the country, and launched groundbreaking programs to stop the erosion of civil liberties in the name of national security and to protect free speech and privacy on the Internet. Ms. Beeson has been recognized as one of the nation's top lawyers by *American Lawyer Magazine* and the *National Law Journal*.

A proud Texan, Beeson has embraced a wide range of innovative strategies to advance social change. Before joining CPPP, she launched a new non-profit to involve the creative sector in social change. In 2012-13, she was a Senior Fellow and Lecturer at the Annette Strauss Institute for Civic Life at the University of Texas, where she co-produced Why Bother? Engaging Texans in Democracy Today, a public media series to inspire more people to get engaged in their communities.

She grew up in Dallas, Texas, and received undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Texas. Beeson obtained her law degree from Emory University School of Law, and served as law clerk to the Honorable Barefoot Sanders, then chief judge of the Northern District of Texas.

Why Bother? Engaging Texans in Democracy Today Civic Pop-Up Space

Sponsored by the Annette Strauss Institute, KLRU-TV, Austin PBS, and KUT Public Radio, the civic pop-up space of *Why Bother? Engaging Texans in Democracy Today* is an interactive, multi-station experience designed to draw in conference participants as well as potential passersby. Each station will encourage citizens to engage around civic issues, neighborhood place-making, and personal experiences. There will be three stations, organized around the following themes:

Listening Booth:

KUT and KLRU-TV will be operating a video and sound recording booth for citizens to share their personal experiences with civic life and ideas for how to improve it.

Neighborhood Identity:

Local artists will lead a creative workshop around the concept of neighborhood identity. Craft a visual manifestation of your neighborhood's identity. Participate in a discussion after the activity around what it means to you and your fellow citizens.

Issue Prioritization:

The issue prioritization board gives citizens the ability to visually prioritize issues that are important to their area (either Austin or more broadly, like Texas). Participants will be invited to write the issues that are most important to them and pin them to a board. Posts will be organized by conference staff to foster a dialogue and ignite conversation around the important issues in Texas.

The Texas Civic Health Index was intended to be a conversation-starter. The data and ideas presented raise as many questions as they answer. In many ways, there is no roadmap for civic engagement in the 21st Century. As the state of Texas continues to grow and change, the way forward can be illuminated with further research and discussion.

During the conference, participants will be invited to join citizen conversations on topics that align with the theme of improving Texas' civic health. All conversations will be held in small classrooms on the 4th and 5th floors of the Belo Center for New Media. Grab your box lunch in the lobby and help us work towards a deeper understanding of what is causing these low levels of civic engagement.

This time will adhere to the principles of an **"open space process"** which include:

- Whoever participates are the right people. You don't need the CEO or hundreds of people, just those that care.
- Whatever happens is the only thing that could have. Let go of expectations; coulds, shoulds, whatever it is, is; work with it.
- When it starts, it starts. When it's over, it's over. Done in ten minutes? Great, move on to something else or join a new group.
- "Law of two feet." If at any time, you find yourself in any situation where you are neither learning nor contributing, use your two feet and go someplace else.

An Associate Professor for the Department of Communication Studies, Dr. Jarvis researches the intersection of language use, politics and persuasion and teaches a variety of courses at the undergraduate and graduate levels including political communication, campaign communication, and persuasion theory. She is the author of The Talk of the Party: Political Labels, Symbolic Capital & American Life (Rowman & Littlefield) and a co-author of Political

Keywords: Using Language that Uses Us (Oxford University Press).

Dr. Jarvis has been the Principal Investigator on a \$100,000 grant to investigate the political participation of college students and working youth (CIRCLE, funded by The Pew Charitable Trusts) and a co Principal-Investigator on two related projects focusing on the politics of youth (over \$550,000 in funding from The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and The Pew Charitable Trusts). She has been the recipient of numerous teaching awards and honors, including the Texas Exes Outstanding Professor for the College of Communication, the Eyes of Texas Teaching Award, and the Outstanding Professor in the College of Communication. In 2005, she was the second Assistant Professor in the history of the University to receive the Friar Centennial Teaching Fellowship, the largest undergraduate teaching honor at U.T. Austin.

Dr. Talia Stroud is an Associate Professor of Communication Studies and Assistant Director of the Annette Strauss Institute for Civic Life at the University of Texas at Austin. Her recent book, *Niche News: The Politics of News Choice* (Oxford University Press) received the International Communication Association's 2012 Outstanding Book Award. Stroud directs



the Engaging News Project, which examines commercially-viable and democraticallybeneficial ways of improving online news coverage. The Project has received generous funding from Google and the Democracy Fund. Stroud's work on the use of likeminded news has received several additional awards, including the Michael Pfau Outstanding Article Award from the National Communication Association and the K. Kyoon Hur Award from the International Communication Association. Her research has appeared in *Political Communication, Journal of Communication, Political Behavior, Public Opinion Quarterly*, and the *International Journal of Public Opinion Research*.
